

Terms of Reference for IRMA Launch Phase Audit Program Partner (September 2018)

IRMA Overview

Founded in 2006 by a coalition of nongovernment organizations, affected communities, mining companies, trade unions, and businesses using minerals and metals in their products, the <u>Initiative for Responsible Mining Assurance</u> (IRMA) stakeholders have a shared vision of a world in which the mining industry respects human rights and the aspirations of affected communities; provides safe, healthy and respectful workplaces; avoids or minimizes harm to the environment; and leaves positive legacies.

IRMA's mission is to establish a multi-stakeholder and independently verified responsible mining assurance system that improves social and environmental performance.

In June 2018, following two global public consultation periods on earlier drafts (2014 and 2016), IRMA released the <u>Standard for Responsible Mining</u>. The IRMA Standard is a comprehensive document with 28 chapters covering issues under the broad categories of business integrity, social responsibility, environmental responsibility, and management systems.

IRMA plans to begin certifying mine sites at the end of 2019. During 2018 and 2019 IRMA is carrying out a Launch Phase learning-mode to help test the Standard's metrics and improve systems to ensure IRMA's accountability and the value of its certification system.

During IRMA's Launch Phase, mines have the opportunity to self-assess their sites using the <u>Mine Measure online self-assessment tool</u>. Later in 2018 and 2019 mines will be encouraged to have IRMA-approved independent auditors evaluate and score their performance. Those assessments will help to further test the metrics of the *Standard for Responsible Mining* at diverse sites globally, informing revisions to improve the Standard.

Terms of Reference

IRMA is seeking to partner with one or more auditing firms to participate in IRMA's Launch Phase verification program. IRMA is willing to consider partnering with one or more unaffiliated auditors as well, if there are candidates with the right skillsets and expertise.

Through partnership, IRMA seeks to simultaneously address two goals: 1) offer mines independent review of achievement during Launch Phase 2018-19 even as the IRMA program is still developing, and 2) develop a longer-term credible training program for auditors capable of ensuring that all chapter of the IRMA *Standard for Responsible Mining* can be consistently and accurately assessed by competent auditors.

The selected firm(s)/auditor(s) will work in a participatory manner with IRMA to fine-tune audit protocols and ensure that auditors are sufficiently trained and prepared to independently assess and score mines during IRMA's Launch Phase. The learnings from this collaborative effort will help form the basis of an auditor training program that will be used to prepare and approve auditors ahead of IRMA's mine site certification in 2019 and beyond. (The 2019 post-Launch Phase auditor program will be open to any interested firms/auditors who meet the relevant qualifications.)



Through this Launch Phase partnership, IRMA is offering the opportunity for the participating firm(s) and/or auditor(s) to help design the IRMA auditing program, gain experience in auditing the IRMA Standard prior to commencement of IRMA's full certification and verification system, and earn income through being amongst the small set approved by IRMA to carry out independent audits during IRMA's Launch Phase.

Successful firms/auditors will also be in a strong position to participate in IRMA's future auditing program as auditors, auditor trainers or in other capacities.

Ideal applicants will:

- Have formal social and/or environmental auditor training and credentials
- Have first-hand experience carrying out social and/or environmental audits at large-scale mining operations
- Be willing to attend in-person auditor training workshop on the IRMA *Standard for Responsible Mining*
- Be willing to work with IRMA in a collaborative manner to help with development of and provide feedback on auditing protocols to be used during IRMA's Launch Phase
- Provide IRMA with feedback from the independent audits that are conducted during IRMA's Launch Phase

Additionally, IRMA is interested in learning from the experiences of other voluntary certification schemes, and also seeks to be compliant with <u>ISEAL's Codes of Good</u> <u>Practice</u>. Consequently, we encourage applications from auditing firms and unaffiliated auditors who have experience in conducting audits as part of ISEAL-compliant certification schemes that evaluate social and/or environmental performance (e.g., Forest Stewardship Council, Responsible Jewellery Council, etc.).

Scope of Work

Between November 2018 and January 2019 successful candidates (e.g., auditing firms and potentially unaffiliated auditors) will:

- Familiarize themselves with the IRMA Standard for Responsible Mining (v.1.0).
- Work with the IRMA Secretariat, through online webinars and/or in-person training workshop(s), to develop a clear understanding the IRMA Standard for Responsible Mining and what is being asked of participant mine sites
- Review and help to improve a set of auditing protocols to be used and tested during IRMA's Launch Phase.

During 2019, successful candidates will:

- Provide auditing services to companies requesting independent verification of achievement as measured against the IRMA Standard
- Provide IRMA with requests for clarifications (should questions or issues arise during the auditing process), and
- Provide feedback on the IRMA auditing protocols following any independent audits carried out by the firm.

Qualifications/Competencies

IRMA is seeking to hire a minimum of one auditing firm. This auditing firm must employ auditors with relevant expertise in social responsibility auditing, and auditors with relevant environmental auditing experience (see Table 1, below, for examples of the types of competencies that would be useful to demonstrate in your application). Individual auditors are not expected to have competencies in both the social and environmental auditing realms.



The firm must also have experience auditing industrial-scale mines, preferably in a range of geographies and countries.

Firms that employ auditors with a range of language skills will be viewed positively.

Auditors should have at least secondary education; recognized formal auditor training,¹ and preferably five (5) years of relevant work experience.
